

## Introduction

It is a great delight to welcome readers to Volume 2, Issue 1, January 2020 edition of *African Journal of Management Information System*. The edition is coming to light after the successful publication of the maiden volume, consisting of four (4) editions, in the year 2019. A total of twenty three (23) papers were published in the volume after a painstaking and rigorous peer review process. Five (5) papers appear in this current edition.

The paper by A. O. Theodorio, O. O. Adeola, B. S. Oluwasola, I. K. Amao and O. O. Akinade dwells on the subject matter of knowledge management. In the paper, the authors presented a solution-driven knowledge management system suitable for organizational reuse. This was illustrated using a case study.

In their work, T. S. Ibiyemi, J. S. Owotogbe and B. A. Adu presented a comparative evaluation of vehicle number plate recognition systems, with particular emphasis on vehicles plying Nigerian roads. After the dataset images have been acquired, the authors subjected them to standard processes including pre-processing, character segmentation, character normalization, feature extraction and recognition of extracted characters.

The theme of the contribution by Bamidele Oluwade revolves round a systemic examination of the relationship between effective management and politics in the broadest sense. The author attempted to provide answers to such questions as: Does an effective manager necessarily have to be a good politician? Is a politician necessarily a manager? The paper hinges on the author's experience in the Nigerian University System for the past 39 years, initially as an undergraduate student, then a postgraduate student, and subsequently as an academic staff who held substantial managerial positions.

The focus of the contribution by Oluwadamilola Ademiluyi, Kingsley Ukaoha and Kareem Otokiti is the development of a neuro-fuzzy based system for the purpose of guidance and counselling of students in educational institutions. The presented system was shown to have a high prediction accuracy.

The last but in no means the least paper in this edition was contributed by K. Otokiti, S. C. Chiemeké and Kingsley Chiwuike Ukaoha. In the paper, the authors provided a framework for using task analysis in selecting skilled persons suitable as members of a typical software development project.

Finally, this is to express appreciation to all persons and organizations that contributed towards the publication of this edition. These include reviewers, editors, editorial manager and personnel, as well as general well-wishers.
